³⁴Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you

that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; ³⁵for I was hungry

and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Matthew 25: 34-36

As we move toward the promise of new life at Easter, this passage [from last month] continues to be appropriate. The Presbyterian Church [USA] has declared itself to be a "Matthew 25" Church. That means this passage - and the entire "sheep and goats' of verses 31-46 - is the Scripture around which our witness and ministry is based.

So, when the leader of this nation:

- 1. Cut off school lunch programs [*I was hungry and you gave me food*]
- 2. Eliminated support for the National Institute of Health and cut off funding for cancer and other medical research [*I was sick and you took care of me*]
- 3. Threatens Medicare and Medicaid, which supports our poorest children and seniors
- Threatens Social Security, which is often the <u>only</u> income for many of our oldest or disabled brothers and sisters.

When that happens, we are called, like the Old Testament prophets who confronted their political and religious leaders to cry: "Thus saith the Lord!". We **must** call them to task.

Most distressing to me are the political leaders who **claim** to be Christian but turn blind eyes to those

abuses - and often actively endorse them. Sadly, it is obvious that none of them have **ever** read Matthew's 25th chapter and, by their own actions, cannot truly claim Christ as Lord.

When I hear one of our leaders say that only cheaters complain when you cut off their only source of income - a man who has more money than he can spend - I am sickened.

When I hear the lies that so many are homeless because they're lazy, or grifters - not because they lost jobs and homes living paycheck to paycheck - or because [like so many of our veterans] they suffer from PTSD - I am enraged.

The list is long - long for the ways **we** are complicit in failing to speak for and support "the least of these"

This is the season when we live in anticipation of the Resurrection – which promises forgiveness and Grace for all of God's children – not to grind our sisters and brothers into the dust.

I know this may annoy or anger some people ["preachers are not supposed to meddle in politics"]. This is not political - it is Scriptural and Theological.

It has become impossible to remain silent. I can do no other.
